President's Message

'A Spanner in the Works'

The Club has been invited to attend the book launch of 'A Spanner in the Works', by author Loretta Smith, celebrating the life of Alice Anderson, Australia's first female mechanic and all female garage proprietor. At our Ladies Night back in November 2017, Deb Alcock gave an enthralling presentation on the short life of Alice Anderson, and the special place she holds in the ranks of women motorists and women who challenged the norm of the day. She became a successful business woman, garage proprietor, industrial product designer and mechanic. Her original garage in Cotham Road, Kew which Alice opened in 1919 is now gone, but the National Motoring Museum, Birdwood S.A, has rebuilt a faithful version of the garage in its exhibition hall. A famous photo of Alice is when she was on a chauffeur trip and she's holding the hand of another girl. Alice's sister wrote on the back of the photo: 'Alice pretending to be the boyfriend of someone she took on a trip!' Loretta Smith's book was featured some months ago in 'The Australian':

'The press affectionately call Alice and her employees 'garage girls'. Fitted out in masculine chauffeur uniforms or overalls, they are often mistaken for boys or men, and rumours of transgressions of all sorts are rife. But they wear the most practical clothing for the job and, thanks to Alice's excellent training and firm guidance, are widely recognised for their professionalism. Alice wears mannish clothes because it is her sartorial preference. However, according to her younger sister Claire, who works at the garage on weekends, she impresses upon her employees that it is not necessary for them to ape men or to lose their femininity.'

Alan Flude – Model T Ford Maven

When it comes to Model T Fords, *Alan Flude* is a walking encyclopaedia who seems to know every aspect of every year of manufacture. I have known Alan since my early days in the hobby and when we caught up at the Ford Flathead Festival he spent time complimenting me on the 1914 Model T Tourer that I was showing. I was fascinated by Alan's knowledge – he pointed to the windscreen – a '13 folds forward while a '14 folds back, look at the 'swage' on the rear tub quarter panel, the '13 body is one inch wider than a '14, '15, or '16 body. My car had a Colonial radiator which held more water for hot climates, my Canadian body had four doors whereas the US body had three doors. And so Alan went over the car point by point.

Alan has been a VCCA (Vic) member now for over 30 years – since 1987 – and having just retired plans to start on an early '13 Model T project that 'he has all the bits for'. One thing I am sure of is that this Model T Ford maven will make sure every single item is true to the year! I came across two evocative photos from 1916 which are featured on page 27, and Alan has supplied the Model T details for us.

Bio of Sarah Maddock (1860 – 1955)...

Quite a number of members expressed interest in the '*Two Spirited Women*' article that featured in last month's *Brass Notes*. Here's an extract of the bio compiled by Diane Langmore:

Sarah Maddock, cyclist, was born on 29 October 1860 at Wolumla, near Eden, New South Wales, daughter of James Porter, stockman, and his wife Mary, née Sullivan. Raised

on a dairy farm and educated locally, she became a competent horsewoman. A childhood accident left her blind in one eye. On 22 February 1886 at St James' Church, Sydney, she married Ernest Alfred Maddock (d.1935), a solicitor's clerk, and by 1890 had three children.

Encouraged by her husband, who had begun cycling in England before migrating, Sarah Maddock began riding a bicycle in 1893, and after several months accompanied him on a 300-mile (483 km) ride from Sydney to Bega, averaging 60 miles (97 km) a day.

Her trip was reported as the first long-distance ride by an Australian woman. Next year this achievement was eclipsed by a 574-mile (924 km) ride from Sydney to Melbourne, accomplished in nine days, their progress monitored by local bicycle clubs. Mrs Maddock rode a 30 lb (14 kg) Conqueror safety machine with dropped frame, gearbox and pneumatic tyres. The first woman to attempt such a feat, she was escorted into the city with her husband by members of the Melbourne Bicycle Club.

Despite poor roads, bushfires, tropical downpours and creeks which had to be forded, the Maddocks completed a 1600-mile (2575 km) round trip to Brisbane in 1895; she rode an imported New Rapid machine.

The return, through New England, took 9½ days, averaging 80 miles (129 km) a day. The Sydney Bicycle Club, of which she had been made an honorary member, presented her with a gold medal. At a time when woman cyclists provoked heated controversy, Sarah Maddock disarmed critics by her grace, style and 'sweet womanliness'. Described by one commentator as 'a graceful light-weight with a poetically pale visage', she was tall, slim and fine featured, with a quiet, reserved and self-effacing manner.

Unlike some other female enthusiasts, she rejected 'rational dress', asserting that the most suitable costume for cycling was a skirt, worn with 'black satin under knickerbockers', which allowed it to 'fall gracefully into place after each stroke of the knee'. While recognizing the 'extreme folly and danger of riding tightly dressed about the waist', she advised that 'stays should by no means be discarded'.

Inspired by Sarah Maddock's example and reassured by journals and magazines as to the popularity of cycling among their counterparts in Europe and America, many women in Victoria and New South Wales took to their bicycles. A women's club was formed in Melbourne shortly after her visit and in February 1895.

Sarah Maddock's life did not follow her convictions. From 1914 she lived apart from her husband, devoting herself to her family and furthering her skills as a golfer, embroiderer and woodcarver. Active still, she died on 9 September 1955 at a daughter's home at Double Bay, Sydney, and was cremated with Anglican rites; her son and two daughters survived her.

But, a dose of reality never hurts and it's always good to keep in perspective how big the global collector car movement is and also the diversity of interests and budgets. \$20 million Porsche Flops at Auction Snafu...



Failed to sell – Porsche Type 64

So read the heading of an article in *CNBC, News* which attracted both my attention and sense of humour. Snafu is a widely used sarcastic military expression meaning 'Situation Normal: All Fouled Up' (Yes, I've substituted the obvious). Anyhow, RM Sotheby's put up for auction at Monterey in August a 1939 Porsche 'Type 64', that was designed and driven by Porsche designed and driven by Porsche AG automobiles founder Ferdinand Porsche. It was expected to sell for over \$20 million but the auction was thrown into disarray by a technical error.

CNBC reported: RM Sotheby's auctioneer started the bidding at \$13 million. But the giant screen display in the auction room showed the first bid as \$30 million. The next bid was \$14 million, but the screen showed \$40 million – an error 'I'm saying 17, not 70,' said the auctioneer, Maarten ten Holder. 'That's 17 million.'

The crowd in the auction room – often a boisterous one after a day of parties and events in the area – immediately started booing and shouting at the error.

There were no more bids after \$17 million was below the reserve price – or minimum required by the seller – RM Sotheby's pulled the lot.

'The car didn't meet reserve,' RM Sotheby's said in a brief statement. 'We will make every effort to sell the car post-sale.'

Some attendees in the audience said that because ten Holder is Dutch, his '17 million' sounded like '70 million,' so both the screen operator and audience was confused.

Whatever the reason, the sale debacle was an embarrassing and costly mistake for RM Sotheby's, which expected to auction off nearly \$200 million worth of cars over the weekend.



Back in 1939 - Ferdinand Porsche Type 64

At the Beginning Porsche Saw the Future...

It was at the Paris World Fair in 1900 that motor industry pioneer Ferdinand Porsche revealed his motor vehicle that was driven by a pair of electric motors incorporated into the front wheels. Capable of a credible 35kph for up to 50km on a full charge of its acid batteries, the Lohner-Porsche vehicle made a sensation sans the usual gears, belts and drive chains of the era.

However, it was not long before Porsche followed the other car makers of Britain, Europe and North America and embraced the internal combustion engine that gave both range and capacity flexibility.

It was back in 1898 that Ferdinand Porsche first designed an electric vehicle – known officially as the 1898 Egger-Lohner electric vehicle, C2 Phaeton, known as P1 signifying Porsche's first design. At the time he was working for car builder Jacob Lohner, and although Porsche had no formal engineering training the aspiring Porsche was challenged to design an electric drivetrain. Porsche was just 22 years old, when his 'P1' engraved vehicle (standing for Porsche number one) was test driven on the streets of Vienna, Austria, June 26, 1898. Its brakes had both an electrical and mechanical system and the suspension for the body and electric motor was designed to counteract the very primitive roads of the era.

The vehicle remained stored in an old warehouse in Austria since 1902 – surviving two world wars. With the car was a hand written note from Ferdinand Porsche explaining the significance of the car and requesting its preservation.

After WWII, a private collector acquired the vehicle, then in 2013 Wolfgang Porsche, the grandson of Ferdinand Porsche was given the opportunity to acquire the car. It was remarkably well preserved, although the lead-acid batteries and bodywork were missing. Now that's what you call a real 'barn find'!

The car weighed only 130kg, and for short periods the 5HP motor could achieve a top speed of 35kph. In September 1899, the vehicle competed in a race from Berlin to Zehlendorf and return where the cars had to travel for 38km with three passengers on board. Ferdinand Porsche drove the P1 across the finish line 18 minutes ahead of the second placed vehicle. Interestingly only four of the field of 19 finished the race, the others 'failed to proceed' because of technical problems.

Today the P1 is on display as a welcoming exhibit at the Porsche Museum in Stuttgart.

In 2020, the first purely electric modern day Porsche – the Taycan – will be released, and it's a high-voltage trailblazer. The powerful rear motor has a compact two-speed automatic transmission. First gear enhances acceleration and at 100km/h switches to second gear. The Taycan can travel from standstill to 100km/h in only 2.8 seconds.



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<u>VCCA (Vic.) Annual Report 2018 – 2019</u>

The past year has again been one of diverse Club activities. The three RACV signature rallies enjoyed excellent attendance, Natter Nights were vibrant and varied, and members also enjoyed the friendship and fellowship of mixing with kindred clubs in the movement. The growth in membership can be partly attributed to the release of the Club history book, *'Dementia Prodest'*, as well as what could be described as 'green shoots' with membership from younger members increasing. Progressive initiatives were undertaken to encourage a younger demographic to attend rallies, we addressed our role in sustainability and environment and also our relationship with the Traditional Owners of our country, and focused on how to attract younger motoring enthusiasts.

At the May '*Natter Night*', Paul Daley articulated the characteristics of our Club, many of which set us apart from other veteran car clubs. A summary of these characteristics include:



- VCCA (Victoria) is a growing Club.
- The three signature RACV rallies are recognised by TAVCCA and other clubs as 'outstanding'.
- Published a safety policy/booklet, which is used by TAVCCA clubs.
- The Club celebrates diversity, and the partners of all members are embraced.
- Brass Notes, brochures, booklets and the Club's book Dementia Prodest are first class productions.
- The Club values, respects and supports its senior members, and those who have retired from veteran motoring.
- All children under 16 can attend events and rallies at no cost.
- The Club respects the indigenous people of the regions we rally and we will arrange a *Welcome to Country* wherever practicable. A Traditional Owners' representative has been appointed (John Stanley).
- The Club cares for the environment; has an environmental and sustainability policy; and has appointed a coordinator (Frances McDougall).
- The Club interacts with other clubs in addition to the clubs of TAVCCA.
- The display of member vehicles to the general public is an essential part of rallies.

These features are addressed in higher fidelity in this report.

Our monthly '*Natter Nights*' have continued to grow in attendance and members have enjoyed a diverse range of speakers. At the AGM in October, Club President, *Paul Daley*, delivered an overview of the past year

and his vision for the coming twelve months. Kim Coillet gave a highly amusing presentation on 'Button hooks' in November, Sue Watts delivered a thoughtful Christmas message at the December evening, Daryl Meek and Fiona Lane presented another 'Show & Tell' session at our February meeting. In March we were privileged to have Russ Kerr and Lisa Vagg from 'Hands on Learning' challenge us with their approach to educating disadvantaged young people and share the successes of HOL. Wing Cdr Robin Page (RTD) was our guest in April where our ANZAC themed evening focused on the role of the RAF in the Cold War. Paul Daley delivered the RSL Ode as members stood in reflection. The Presentation Evening in May was attended by over 84 members, and Geoff Cosgriff, RACV Deputy Chairman presented the Club's Awards and guest speaker was lan Berg, who delivered an outstanding presentation on the history of the Rolls-Royce Silver Ghosts that have been involved with the VCCA (Vic). David Provan conducted a moving tribute to the following members who had passed on during the year: Frank Dallimore, Ian Smith, Ralph Quaine, Graeme Edwards, Lorna McManamny, and Alan Burn.

Our June meeting featured a movie '*Tucker: The Man* and His Dream', and in July we hosted our fourth Henry Ford Oration, presented again by Brian Churchill, who presented a challenging overview of Henry Ford and his peers. There was an excellent attendance with a strong contingent of guests from other motoring clubs. Barry Gomm, a past President of our Club gave a humorous talk, 'We Shook, Rattled and Rolled in the 1950's' at the August meeting. The September meeting featured *Callum Walsh*, who is one of our younger Committee members and his subject 'The Next Generation' was well received.

The RACV Veteran Car Club Annual Rally was held at Cape Schanck 10-11 November 2018. Rally director *Deb Alcock* with *Ben Alcock* put together a memorable event with the nostalgic theme 'Remember When...', a trip down memory lane of a bygone Veteran motoring era. There were 50 entries and over 100 participants with Rally Headquarters the spectacular RACV Cape Schanck Resort. Entrants enjoyed touring a diverse area of rich countryside, countless vineyards, rugged coastline, pastures and forests. On Remembrance Day at 11:00am, *Paul Daley* delivered an overview of the meaning of the 'One Minute Silence", and delivered the RSL Ode.

The RACV 1&2 Cylinder Rally, March 14-17, was based in the picturesque town of Bright, and Rally Director *John Stanley* put together an event that was outstanding. Assisted by *Michael & Claudia Holding*, the event had four days of varied activity – a highlight being the Aboriginal Welcome Ceremony by the local Dhu Dhu Roa tribe. A standout feature was the public display on the Saturday morning that saw hundreds of locals and visiting tourists watch RACV Director Alex Downie flag off the entrants for their day's run at 10:00am. *Paul Daley* hosted the Saturday evening dinner and acknowledged previous Ron Hobbs trophy winners: *Colin Daniels* (2007), *Brian Scudds* (2013) *and Kevin Quigley* (2015). This year's Ron Hobbs winners were *Martin and Tina Smallman*, 1911 Stanley Steamer.

The *RACV Midwinter Rally* was held at the RACV Inverloch Resort, 20-21 July. Rally director *Ben Alcock* put together two terrific days of veteran motoring in a part of Victoria that was unfamiliar to many. There were 30 entrants and the touring afforded some stunning scenery with very little traffic. The Saturday evening dinner MC'd by *Paul Daley* featured the normal 'Cold Start' wagering, a greeting from RACV Director Alex Downie, and concluded with a fascinating historical presentation prepared by *Fiona Lane* and able delivered by *Daryl Meek*. The Cold Start competition on the Sunday morning saw 10 entrants, with the winner being *James Dunshea* 6.5 seconds.

The RACV has been the Club's major sponsor now for over 57 years and this relationship has been an integral part of the Club's success. At the RACV 1&2 Cylinder Rally, RACV Director Alex Downie announced that the sponsorship for next year will be increased to enable RACV participation in additional rallies. *Paul Daley* advised members that in 2019-2020 there will be five signature RACV events: RACV Midwinter Rally, RACV Veteran Car Club Annual Rally, RACV 1&2 Cylinder Rally, RACV Four and More Rally, and RACV Pre-05 Pioneers Run. RACV sponsorship of events must align with the RACV principles of Safety, Connectivity and Community and our events should feature a component of accessibility for the public to enjoy.

The Club calendar seems to be always full of varied events, apart from Rallies. For many years Frank Pound has organised Saturday morning 'Breakfast Runs' at various points throughout Melbourne over the warmer months. In mid year we have an 'Around the Garages' and on June 19 we visited 'The Healey Factory' in Mitcham, and then went to the residence of *Penny* and Brendan Pierce for a BBQ lunch and a tour of his collection of memorabilia and veteran and vintage cars. We enjoy the friendship of other clubs, and on July 14 participated in the 'Naked Radiator Run' with the VDC and some of our younger members, Ben Alcock, James Dunshea, Nick Horn, Stuart McCorkell were involved. A highlight of our Vice President / Events Director Ben Alcock year was our Club's attendance to the 2019 Kalorama Rally, 24 March, where our display of 15 veteran cars supported the feature car of the show Stuart Murdoch's 1914 Grand Prix Delage. Our Club took out the coveted Best Club Display of the day award.

This year's *Four and More Rally* was held in Corowa NSW, 25-28 April, with Rally Directors *David 'T' Lang* and *Don McPherson,* organising four days of 'pay as you go' veteran motoring. Local volunteer organisations provided lunches and morning teas,

and this quaint river town welcomed our visit. With 23 entrants there was a packed programme that included Morgan's Lookout, Jinders Pioneer Museum, Collendina Station and the Corowa Federation Museum, and the Rally Dinner at the RSL.

Our Club magazine 'Brass Notes' is now published ten editions per annum, and the editorial responsibility is undertaken by Ian Berg and Paul Daley. Gordon and Roger Berg prepare the magazine's layout. We are fortunate to have members who provide photographs of our events and we acknowledge the contribution of Callum Walsh, Frances McDougall, James and Sherryn Dunshea and Gordon Berg. This popular publication is respected by our peers in the movement and is included with annual membership. This year over 40% of our members receive it in electronic format. Ian Berg also sends out regular electronic communications to all members with email and other motoring publications are attached, an initiative which receives many appreciative comments. The Club's high quality rally books are produced by our printing sponsor NEO and we thank them for their support. The route maps of our rallies are produced by Brendan Walsh and we acknowledge his practical support.

The second Pre-1905 Pioneers Run at Ballarat was held on the Motoring Heritage weekend 18-19. The organising team was *Greg and Denise Smith, Ben Alcock, James Dunshea, Mick Miller* and they were well supported by other Club members. The event is now recognised as a TAVCCA national event and is growing in popularity with interstate entrants. The Ballarat locale suits this era of motoring perfectly and there was a diverse collection of vehicles participating – Penny-Farthing bicycles, motorcycles, and other assorted vehicles. First time out was: Daryl Meek 1904 Oldsmobile, *Tony Duviosin* 1903 Waltham Orient, *Mick Turner* 1904 Clement Motorcycle, and *Russell Holden* 1902 Elmore. The event will be run again next year on the same weekend.

Our responsibility to be custodians of our environment and to operate the Club in a sustainable manner was addressed by the Committee. Plastic rally bags, bag 'stuffers', waste oil disposal and needless items are on our radar, and *Frances McDougall* has been appointed to the role of *Sustainability and Environment*. This is a non-committee role that demonstrates our commitment to environmental matters. Frances has taken many positive initiatives in this role e.g. recycling/reusing plastic rally name sleeves.

A highlight of the RACV 1&2 Cylinder Rally at Bright was the Aboriginal 'Smoking Ceremony!' The Committee has decided to continue this practice at RACV signature rallies and agreed unanimously 'that at future signature rallies, the event director shall consider organising a 'Welcome to Country' and for an acknowledgement of the traditional owners'. To facilitate this action John Stanley has agreed to take on the role of our Traditional Owners Liaison person.

We have been able to contribute to the wider community this year. At the RACV Veteran Car Club Annual Rally we raffled a superbly crocheted blanket, the handiwork of member *Barbara Staples*. We raised \$350, which *Paul Daley* presented to the Crib Point RSL – a small community club of 130 members. At the Good Friday Hot Cross Bun we raised by gold coin donation \$812.45 which was donated to the 2019 Good Friday Appeal, The Royal Children's Hospital. *Brian Hussey, Ben Alcock* and *Peter Hammet* have agreed to form a small working party to explore ideas as to where the Club can raise funds for charity and support those who are disadvantaged.

The Club acknowledges and is grateful for the ongoing work of our Honorary Auditor, *Gerry Howell*, and the wise counsel and advice we receive from our Honorary Legal Advisor *Michael Tippett*. Working behind the scenes also is our Registrar *Geoff Payne*, who handles membership and CPS, and *Michael and Claudia Holding*, who assist each month with the preparation of accounts and rally advice.

Our Library and Archives continue to grow under the stewardship of *Daryl Meek*. On the last Tuesday of each month a group meet for lunch at the Club rooms and assist Daryl with cataloguing. The facility also benefits from the generosity of our members who have the opportunity to voluntarily give to the Library a donation with their Annual Club Subscription. This initiative raises up to \$800 per annum. The Club is also now uploading selected material on the Victorian

Collections website, and is the first car club to do so. The Library welcomes donations of books, ephemera, photos and other material from the estate of past members. This philanthropy enables our archives to grow and ensures that memories remain.

The motoring movement is served by two 'peak bodies' - the AOMC and Federation, and our representatives are Andrew McDougall, Daryl Meek and Brian Hussey. We have been represented by these delegates at both local and country meetings, and have been given regular reports. There is little interaction between the two 'peak bodies' and in January, Brass Notes, Paul Daley stated 'It is time to place on the agenda for 2019 he need for a single effective voice that can lobby and effect change for the historic motoring movement?! This remains an outstanding issue for the movement.

Our members enjoy the reciprocal benefits of our kindred clubs throughout Australia. Some of the events we have participated in and reported on were: Early Willys Overland Roundup, Orange NSW, 14-19 October; The Cracked Plug Run February 28 - March 7 Tasmania; National Veteran Motorcycle Rally, 10-15 March; Brush National Rally 22-26 April.

The reviews of 'Dementia Prodest' have resulted in lan Berg and Paul Daley being invited to visit other motoring clubs, where Ian has delivered his 'slideshow' and polished presentation on the making of 'Dementia Prodest'. They visited Vintage Sports Car Club, the MG Car Club, the Rolls-Royce Owners Club, and the Vintage Drivers Club. Paul drove his 1913 Willys Overland 69T to display at two of the meetings.

Brian Hussey and Bob Ballinger lead a team of talented and dedicated Scrutineers that are willingly 'on call' to assist members with maintaining their standards of their vehicles. The team has recently welcomed well known Gippsland member Peter Johnson to the team. This service is particularly appreciated by country members whose vehicles can be inspected at a mutually convenient time.

To encourage the next stage of our membership growth, the Club has embraced a 'Children Free!' policy for all its events. What this means is that children will not be charged for listed activities and meals on our Rally entry forms or at any of our Club day events. We have advised the AOMC and the Federation of this initiative. The Club understands that some of our older members are unable to drive long distances, and may be too frail to continue veteran motoring. To encourage these members to attend the 2020 national event in Swan Hill, the Club will offer to pay the cost of train travel to that event for our Club's senior citizens.

Since 2010 the Club has awarded 50 year membership badges recognising that important milestone in one's life with the Club. 50 Year Membership Awards were presented at the May Presentation evening to the following members joined the Club in 1969; David and Marge Barnard, Stan and Maggie Bone, Honorary Life Members Gordon and Shirley Griffiths, Richard and June Heron, and Sandra Splatt. There are a number of members who are approaching 60 years membership and the Committee has taken the initiative to strike a commemorative 60 Year 'Diamond' Badge for presentation to these longstanding members.

The social aspect of our Club is for many a primary feature, with the supper at Natter Nights organised by Kath and David Wright with Maggie Bone, Rayna Guthrie, Paula McNicoll, and Joan Scudds, and a roster of other ladies who prepare sandwiches. Six of our evenings feature pre-meeting drinks and John *Prior* handles the bar service. Our February meeting is popular with a BBQ dinner and this hospitality which the Club extends to members is warmly appreciated. Our calendar features two Ladies Nights in March and November, as well as an Interclub Petanque Competition hosted by Andrew and Frances McDougall in November.

In October 11-17 2020 the Club will be hosting the RACV 2020 National Veteran Vehicle Rally in Swan Hill. Rally Directors Michael and Claudia Holding have been busy planning and organising, and accommodation bookings are already open for the event. For our Club this will be the highlight event for a packed calendar in 2020.

The Club's Secretary, David Provan will retire in October, having served the maximum term of five years as per our Constitution. I thank David for his outstanding contribution and the professional manner and creative yet measured advice provided during his tenure.

As your President, I acknowledge the wonderful support I have received from the Executive team: David Provan - Secretary, Ben Alcock - Vice President/ Club Captain, and Peter Hammet - Treasurer. The Committee has been a delight to work with and this report demonstrates what such teamwork and multiple talents can achieve.

The 7th HCCA International Tour

August 30 to September 6, 2019.

The Australian Horseless Carriage Club of America (HCCA) tour has been a long time in the planning and Russell, Chris and Andrea Holden pulled it off superbly at Mount Panorama in Bathurst, New South Wales. The HCCA has never held a tour in Australia before, and with Russell being on the board of the club he was keen to see a major event here. There were 50 pre-1916 vehicles entered and 120 people which included 19 from the USA and four from Canada. Don Pumb, Vice President of the HCCA, Keene Brewer Treasurer and Tracy Lester, Editor of the HCCA Gazette also attended. Gil, Tom and Kristan Glecan brought their 1914 Model T Ford out from San Diego for the tour and planned to drive it on to the National Rally in Bargara, Queensland later in the month, then on top of that attending the Model T Ford National Rally in October - a fantastic effort.

Rally headquarters for the event was the Rydges Hotel, overlooking the Mount Panorama circuit and many entrants were able to avail themselves of the camping and motorhome facilities within the circuit.

With so many 'swaggies' a special effort was made at each of the morning briefings to ensure that everyone had the opportunity to travel in a veteran car and this encouraged many new friendships and acquaintances. We visited places that Sue and I had never heard of including the historic Abercombrie House and the incredible 85 acre Mayfield Gardens, as well as numerous delightful country towns including Tarana, Oberon and Blayney. Touring was typically 120-130 km most days and the roads were for the most part clear of modern traffic, which is just as well for some of the smaller cars as there were some challenging hills. On more than one occasion the Ford Model T trick of going up the hill backwards was employed and yes there were some cars towed up. But this is all part of the challenge of driving the earliest of cars as we know. There were some breakdowns but a number of the cars were able to be returned to the tour following some resourceful repairs. Notably Graham and Irene Donges in the 1909 Brush were able to get back on the road after a heroic rear axle re-manufacture (see sidebar story)

A novel and successful feature was the hat seminar and workshop put on by Robyn Betts which was very popular. As many know Robyn and Bill are always to be seen in splendid period costume on tour and this was a great chance to share in Robyn's ideas and experience in setting up for the correct attire and most of all having fun doing it.



The advantage of wooden axles - how to make one mid-tour.

Graham Donges had an early failure on the 1909 Brush when a major split developed on the timber axle. The first attempt to bandage it was not really successful and hence the prospects of completing the tour did not look good. As often happens on tour in country towns however somebody knew somebody from The Woodies, the Central Tablelands Woodcraft Inc. This is a local community group with a fully equipped word-working shop. A suitable piece of stringy bark was sourced and provided gratis, then the job of recreating a new turned and tapered axle generously undertaken by the members of the group. The result was a perfect front axle which was quickly remounted and Graham and Irene were back on tour.


The EE Wagstaff Continental Eight Day Clock

Brass Notes August 2019 immediately directed me to what I had already written as 'A Fascination with Motoring Along the Coorong Desert'. Ian Berg has more than introduced Mr Ernest E. Wagstaff, a leading motorist from Melbourne, with memberships of the automobile clubs of Victoria and NSW, and who was managing director of the British Imperial Oil Co. It was Wagstaff's huge Daimler that had previously caught my eye with several historical connections with the two veteran cars that I am involved with. Closer still, it is Wagstaff driving his Daimler across the inhospitable and roadless Coorong Desert, and the clock from Wagstaff's Daimler itself.

Connection ONE is from Warwick Anderson with whom I restored the 1908 Isotta Fraschini Voiturette. This brass clock was given from Wagstaff's Daimler. The engraving on the rim of the clock records the historic drive where the Daimler was the first heavy motor car to drive the inhospitable, and roadless Coorong desert, with a change of passengers for the return trip.



Engraved also are the passengers names: Dr Levin and Mr E.F. Pollock Melbourne to Adelaide and Mr E. Edwards and Mr G. Cummings Adelaide to Melbourne. We may assume that Mrs Wagstaff was given the opportunity to occupy a front seat.

On the way to Adelaide, when along the Coorong, Wagstaff later reported to 'The Motor in Australia' journal of the time, that: "After leaving Cantara Station in the direction of Meningie....at about the fourteenth mile post...a small lagoon...I had the pleasure of meeting Mr Bertie Barr Smith's 60 hp Napier, with Mr Murray Aunger, of Adelaide to Port Darwin fame, at the wheel. The meeting in the first place was interesting, inasmuch as they were stopped on one side of the lagoon just previously mentioned, while I was stopped in the other, both of us bent on making an examination as to a safe passage across or a good track around. The latter was resolved upon.'

The Napier, with Aunger and Barr Smith, continued towards Melbourne, on what was reported as a 'pleasure tour', but was in fact to set a Melbourne to Adelaide record. However just before reaching Casterton the car was severely damaged when 'sinking into a deep, sandy gutter, struck a boulder, tearing the front axle away from the springs, disarranging the steering gear, and making a large dent in the engine crankcase.' The car was trucked to Melbourne on 2 February 1909, and was soon repaired by Charles Kellow's workforce in Russell Street, with a test run to Geelong and back two days before the record attempt commenced at the Melbourne GPO at 9 pm, Monday 8 February 1909, after '... a pleasant little dinner to entertain the passing motorists at Hosie's Café.'

The attempt to drive the distance in less than 24 hours was soon reported in the press with 'Melbourne to Adelaide within a day. Time 22 hours 24 minutes.' When Barr Smith's 1907 60 hp Napier, registration '340', arrived in Adelaide at 7 pm the following day, it was met by a cheering crowd at the Adelaide GPO.


Connection TWO, is that a pair of little Isotta Fraschini voiturettes that you may be familiar with in the VCC were then, by mid 1909 displayed for sale in Charles Kellow's showroom.

Connection THREE is that 'our' 20 hp 1911 Prince Henry Vauxhall, registration '813', driven by Murray Aunger and new owner Harold Bowman contested the 'Dunlop Relay Ride, a Military Despatch Race' that ran from the Adelaide to Sydney. Starting at the Adelaide GPO on Good Friday 1912, their time to Kingston, again along the same paths of the inhospitable Coorong coast, was faster than that of the Napier by 1 hour 45 minutes, before they were then delayed by 'torrential rain and a northerly wind' on their way to Mount Gambier. That is yet another yarn, as are those of the many record breaking attempts between cities, but none so severe as the Coorong, or perhaps the man made 'V gutters' of the long road to Sydney town.

Our Model T Ford guru, Alan Flude writes: I believe these were taken in circa 1915 to 1916, during WW1 with most cars displaying a Red Cross (or hospital/ ambulance cross) logo on the windscreen. Regarding those cars, most are Model T Fords with an unknown vehicle (with cross logo) following the 2 horse drawn buggies in the middle of the road.

Right side vehicles:

Front car a 1915 Model T Ford Tarrant Roadster (Tarrant body), may be a 1916 model?

The following 3 cars lined up behind appear to be the same as the front car.

Left side vehicles:

Front car a 1915 Model T Ford Roadster (Canada body), with 'Commercial' trunk fitted (replacing the turtle deck).
