Graeme Chard recognised his T Ford in the February FLASHBACK photo and provided the following comments.

I will say Greg Smith has done some good detective work regarding the T Ford in the February FLASHBACK photo. In Jan 1990 I had only recently purchased the 1916 T-Ford and I think it was the first Club run that I took the car on to go to the Hermitage. It was a sunny day and I do recall putting the hood down for the journey home. These days the side mirror is different to the one in the picture.

The one thing that would 100% confirm it is my car but I could not make out in picture is it has rare demountable rims. This aside I would say it is my car and I still have it today.

Peter Crauford has provided some interesting information on the Vinot & Deguingand in the March *Brass Notes* FLASHBACK photo;

'Some 40 years ago I heard of a fellow near Bendigo who owned two interesting veteran cars. I was living in South Australia and some months later when on my way to Sydney I called in to see him. His name was Innes and the family were, and still are, motor car dealers in Bendigo. Mr Innes lived in a then new house on the Inglewood Road. He took me to his new shed/garage alongside his house and showed me his 2 veteran tourers, a Rover and a Vinot & Deguingand. He told me that he had rallied both cars but was told by the then president not to bring them to a rally until they were restored! He was extremely put out by these instructions and never rallied them again. They were lovely complete and original cars.'

'I had always wondered what became of them and after moving from Western Victoria to the Macedon Ranges late last year I resolved to find them if possible. I found the house without much difficulty although whereas the house stood alone years ago, it was now amongst lots of houses. There were lots of child's toys, small bikes etc. at the house and no one was at home but I realised that the house had changed hands! Eventually I found an Innes family member who told me that both cars had been sold overseas years ago. I imagine this is the Vinot pictured in *Brass Notes*.'

The Green Book... some background

While visiting the Gilmore Car Museum, Hickory Corner, West Michigan US, I came across a rather confronting display – an African-American mother with her child and the Buick Eight at an ESSO Standard gas station in the 1950's.

And so began my interest in '*The Green Book*'- the black traveller's guide that was first published back in the 1930's. Today, the movie '*Green Book*' is headline news taking out on February 24 (controversially) the coveted Best Picture award at this year's Oscars. '*Green Book*' followed the (reportedly true) story

of a black musician and his white driver, the film protagonist, in the Deep South of America in 1962. It is 'inspired' by the true friendship of Tony Vallelonga, an Italian-American body guard from The Bronx, and Dan Shirley, the black pianist Vallenlonga is hired to drive and protect on a concert tour. Reviewing the film in '*Vox*', *Alissa Williamson* says there were four things she learned about the *Green Book* in the movies:

1. If you were a black American in the middle of the 20th century you most certainly knew about the Green Book. If you were a travelling black the book was essential for your safety – the Green Book was the bible of every Negro highway traveller in the 1950's – 60's.

2. The Green Book was necessary no matter which part of the country you were travelling through. The Green Book did not restrict its listing just to places like Georgia or Alabama in the South – it was a lifeline for travellers virtually anywhere in the country.

3. What the Green Books omitted is as significant as what they contained. It's a stark reminder of the long American tradition of respectability politics

4. *The 1962 edition of the Green Book.* (the year that the movie is set) there are listings for restaurants, hotels, entertainment establishments and even antique stores. The country was pretty much very racist, everywhere you went.

For many Australians, there's an immediate connection with the era with the song 'Route 66' – a Rolling Stones hit of 1964, and covered since by nearly every aspiring garage rock band:

Well, if you ever plan to motor west just take my way that's the highway that's the best, get your kicks on Route 66.

Last October, the writer and photographer Candacy Taylor received a grant from the *Route 66 Corridor Preservation Program* to photograph *Green Book* listings along the road – of which fewer than onethird are still standing and fewer than 5 per cent are operational. *Airbnb Magazine* picks up the story. For most Americans, Route 66 represents freedom: wide-open highway, hair blowing in the wind, kitschy roadside attractions. But there is another side to the Mother Road – one that writer and photographer Candacy Taylor has spent years unearthing. Back in the Jim Crow era, black Americans driving through the US relied on a travel guide called *The Negro Travellers' Green Book* to tell them where they could and couldn't stop – for gas, a meal, a motel room. The book was produced by Victor H. Green, a black postal worker from Harlem, New York, and published between 1936 and 1967. Without this so-called Bible of Black Travel, a black motorist might unwittingly pull into a cafeteria or filling station where the reception would be hostile.

In August 2018 the NAACP issued its first ever statewide travel advisory, in Missouri. 'Sometimes people say to me, 'Thank God, we don't need Green Books anymore' or 'Thank God, that's over,' but it's not over,' says Taylor.

Here are a few examples of Green Book sites that are still standing:

The Dunbar Hotel, Los Angeles:

'The Dunbar was the first hotel in America built expressly for black people. It drew the crème de la crème of black intelligentsia and became a hot spot for Billie Holiday, Louis Armstrong, Duke Ellington, Count Basie, and Sarah Vaughan, who'd play at nearby clubs.

Clifton's Cafeteria, Los Angeles:

'Clifton's is legendary – and bizarre. Clifford Clinton, a white man, opened the first one in downtown LA at the terminus of Route 66, and it was interracial from the start.

Fitzgerald's Motel, Myrtle Beach, SC

'The owners of Fitzgerald's also owned a music club called Charlie's: this was another place where Lena Horne, Billie Holiday, and Duke Ellington hung out.

The motel is legendary because of these stars but also because there was a KKK shootout there in 1950.



The Apollo Theater, Harlem, NY

'I have documented close to 400 Green Book sites in Harlem – it was Victor Green's home base – and the Apollo Theater is obviously an iconic site, but it's interesting because there were no other travel guides that really featured nightclubs in that way' said Taylor. Ultimately, the 1964 Civil Rights Act, which outlawed discrimination in public accommodations, made the Green Book unnecessary almost overnight. It remained in publication until 1966, but Victor Green, who died in 1960, neither made that choice nor saw the end of segregation, which he believed would eventually put him out of business.

Twenty two editions of the Green Book (and one supplement) were published from 1937 to 1966, and the sadness inherent in the very existence of the Green Book came through. The end of the introduction to the 1949 edition made this clear. After thanking the United States Travel Bureau's 'Negro Affairs' office for their support, and asking



readers to send their feedback and mention the book to establishments that might was to be listed, Green concludes: There will be a day sometime in the near future when this guide will not have to be published. That is when we as a race will have equal opportunities and privileges in the United States. It will be a great day for us to suspend this publication for then we can go wherever we please, and without embarrassment.

'But until that time comes we shall continue to publish this information for your convenience each year.'

In the May Edition of Brass Notes we will share some fascinating stories of African Americans in the veteran era who were involved in the embryonic development of the automobile.

Back in 1898 it actually climbed the hill outside the Moulin Rouge in Paris to generate interest in the 'motor car' - on Christmas eve that year he won a bet with his friends that his invention with it's innovative crankshaft could beat a car with a bicycle-like chain up the slope of Rue Lepic, in Montmartre Paris, and together with his two older brothers Marcel and Fernand, he formed the Renault Freres company in February 1899.

Daryl Meek updates AOMC on Federal Government Issues...

At the last AOMC Delegates meeting, *Daryl Meek*, in his capacity with the RACV updated delegates on Federal Government issues. Daryl spoke about the work of the Australian Historical Vehicles Interest Group (AHVIG), which has sent in a submission to the Federal Government on the LCT issue. They are now looking at the asbestos issue and the National Vehicle Standards that are under review. Several points of concern are that any vehicle over 25 years old and over 3.5 tons is banned from being imported into Australia. Also, all vehicles imported need to be on a register of approved vehicles. Daryl and Doug Young had a meeting in Canberra with government officials, and they appeared to be receptive.

Protection of moveable cultural heritage: The Act has been reviewed, and no changes to the act but some rule changes. The major win is that a vehicle does not need to have a specific date or value to be considered significant under this act, so any vehicle considered to be of significance will need a special license before it can be exported. Daryl asked if anyone thinks that a significant vehicle is about to be exported dubiously, please get in contact with either the AOMC or himself.

Wing Cdr Robin Page (Rtd) to address Natter Night

Our April Natter Night will again have an ANZAC theme, and our quest speaker will be Wing Cdr Robin Page (Rtd). Robin had a stellar career with the RAAF, highlights being commanding squadron of Shackleton bombers in the Cold War, based in the UK, and involved with maritime reconnaissance. The Shackleton was crucial in guarding the North Atlantic from an anticipated rapid expansion of the Soviet Navy's submarine force. Robin then returned to Australia, and led the world famous RAAF Roulettes on their many displays across the nation - many members will recall the Roulettes flying over the MCG on Grand Final day. Robin is a past president of the MG Car Club, and today heads the Pre-War Register of that club. This will be another 'not to be missed' evening: 8:00pm Natter Night April 9.

The Cracked Plug Run 28 February – 7 March 2019

In 2016 Jill Hawkins and Kelvin Callahan organised a Peter Waddle memorial rally from the north west of Tasmania (Woolnorth) to as far south east as the roads go (The End of the Road at Cockle Creek). Fast forward to 2019 and the same two were at it again organising the Cracked Plug run to traverse the other diagonal - from the north east (Cape Portland) to as far south west as the roads go (Gordon Dam past Strathgordon). Once again they delivered a wonderful rally which took the last two years to organise. The roads we travelled were certainly challenging in places but our veteran cars are more than capable of meeting that challenge. However it is the sort of trip that most of us (mad dogs and English men excepted) probably wouldn't attempt without the comfort of having the backup of two breakdown trailers and a luggage trailer.

Normally what happens on tour stays on tour but it would be remiss of me not to whet your appetite with a few hints. It turns out that a certain Victorian is much more the life of the party sans matrimonial supervision. My lips are sealed, of course, but if you thought about it and drew your own conclusions you may well be on the right track.

Numbers are necessarily limited by the shortage of available accommodation in some of the overnight stays. This, coupled with the length of these events, means that you get to know all the entrants, renewing existing friendships and forging new ones. Not surprisingly most of the 2016 entrants signed up for the 2019 event including the two English men (Andrew and Shaun) who seem to visit that frequently that they are almost de facto Tasmanians. They even cater for people, such as the author, who hail from Tasmania's northern island (the Australian mainland) with organised runs from Devonport to the start of the event and back to Devonport after its conclusion.

For us the fun started at Port Melbourne as cars travelling to Devonport lined up ready to board. After a smooth sailing we drove to Turners Beach for a hearty welcome breakfast at the Hawkins' residence where we were joined by some of the entrants from northern

Tasmania. Luggage was safely stowed and last minute repairs and adjustments made by those that needed them. Michael Holding might have brought a different car but seeing him rebuilding its water pump was a case of déjà vu.

The car might have been different but at least he brought the same wife although not everyone must have been convinced as she was not infrequently referred to as Cynthia. One person, who knows Claudia well, when hearing Claudia referred to as Cynthia said "It's not Cynthia, it's Cindy". At least Claudia/Cynthia/ Cindy had been warned that she would be "camping" which in Claudia-ese means dropping form 5 star accommodation to 4 star.

It was time to set off for Launceston, travelling mostly on rural back roads through Spreyton and Railton before reaching the A1 just south of Elizabeth Town for the run into Deloraine. Steve Fleming's Studebaker suddenly decided to run very rich and looked like it was trying to be a carbon conversion device. At Deloraine we had lunch in the 50s diner surrounded by lots of memorabilia including a fantastic collection of petrol bowsers many of which would have been relics even back in the 50s.

Thursday morning we were treated to a fabulous welcome breakfast at the Northern Section's club rooms. There we received a comprehensive rally survival pack with heaps of useful items including cable ties, band aids, towels, mittens, lollies, toilet paper, pot pourri, CP book mark, a fabulous rally badge and, of course, the rally instruction book The exit from the car park was rather steep and a portent of what was to await us later in the week. The first of many marvellous morning teas was enjoyed at the top of the Sidling before heading to lunch at Scottsdale Recreation Reserve. Lunch over we travelled in convoy past the North East Soldiers Memorial Hospital on route to Gladstone, the last available petrol stop and purveyor of the highest priced soft drinks (\$5/bottle) that the author has ever struck. Then it was off to Icena Farm for a welcome barbeque. David Provan's doctor's

coupe needed some minor surgery itself as it had lost some of its spark. The author was one of the onlookers who learnt a lot about magneto re-building as Andrew McDougall did wonders with a sheet of paper, a pair of scissors and a few more usual automotive tools. For some of us, the author included, there was a pleasant night time drive (6 volt headlights do leave a lot to be desired) to a stone hut at Cape Portland for a good night's sleep.

Friday morning the author and the other seven occupants of the stone hut got a rare chance to sleep in as the rest of the group had to drive from Icena to Cape Portland. After another lovely morning tea we got a tour of the wind farm at Cape Portland and a chance to go inside the base of one of the turbine towers. If you've never been up close to one you probably don't fully realise just how big they are. Then the cars were lined up for a group photo before heading of to the picturesque seaside town of Tomahawk for lunch at the caravan park. The first part of the journey involved returning to Gladstone so the author got to see the scenery he had driven past in darkness the night before. Bill and I had a rest from driving duties as Vivian drove the first leg from Cape Portland to Gladstone and later in the day from Tomahawk to Bridport. I think that she was the only woman driver on the rally but I am hopeful that more will take up the challenge. Somehow Greg Smith managed to miss the Tomahawk turn off (was that deliberate?) and so reached Bridport early where, as one would, he inveigled his way into a buck's party with the buck having to wear a pink tutu. One could suggest that he traded a turn off for a turn on. From Tomahawk we followed Greg's footsteps, well more correctly his tyre tracks, to Bridport for our overnight stop. Over the evening meal at the pub the poms' brass lights, which had magically disappeared, were auctioned off with Peter Hawkins the apparent high bidder.

Saturday we headed to the Batman Bridge pausing before crossing for another lovely morning tea. Sunday and we were on the move again, this time stopping at Pearns Steam World in Westbury for morning tea. Several of our contingent were experiencing magneto issues so they diverted to look up a local magneto expert now retired. Then it was time for the big climb to the Great Lake region with lunch at the Hawkins' cabin at Breona on the way. There is a drastic change in the vegetation as you crest the top of the climb. That, combined with the view, is a rather amazing experience. The author got a tow to the top of the climb due to a carburettor issue that couldn't be resolved quickly roadside. In the light of day (actually more in the dark of night if you want to be accurate) having reached our destination (The Great Lake Motel) it turned out to be a vacuum tank issue and not a carburettor one. The poms must have been out for revenge as John Handley's brass lights were auctioned off with the local publican being the high bidder. The hotel staff were somewhat stretched so Andrew McDougall offered to help and was duly issued with an apron which the author feels rather suited him and that is all the author is prepared to say about the matter although he is, reportedly, open to bribery.

Monday we continued on past the Great Lake with our first stop at a vantage point overlooking the dam walls. I say dam walls plural because over the years the height of the lake has been increased twice by building new dam walls. Due to the water level being relatively low we could see the most recent concrete wall, much of the previous concrete wall and some of the original wooden dam wall. The cars were somehow all squeezed in to the car park so that a group photo could be taken with the Great Lake in the background. Morning tea was in the Steppes church hall. Then on to Bothwell Public school where lots of the children were taken for rides around the oval. A short detour enabled many of us to visit a collection of trucks and tractors. Probably even more interesting to most was the large collection of old oil cans and bottles and other garage

ephemera. From there we continued to Brighton for a very lovely and very well priced evening meal before heading off to bed – some earlier than others.

Tuesday's target was Strathgordon. Very nice morning teas and lunches were supplied by Westerway Public School, the former consumed at the school itself and the latter at Scotts Peak Road Junction. That road was still closed due to recent fire activity. Then it was a case of start your engines and head to Strathgordon. The scenery was breathtaking but the road is definitely a challenge in places. On the way we experienced firsthand the aftermath of some of the recent fires. Having got to Strathgordon a number of us didn't recognise our accommodation and did some bonus kilometres – both horizontal and vertical. The author was lucky to have been allocated to a unit with laundry facilities which was a great help as we had been travelling for quite some time.

Wednesday morning and we only had a relatively short way to travel to reach the south west end of the diagonal we had been travelling since Friday morning. Whilst the distance may not have been great I can assure you that there was no shortage of steep climbs and descents. We were privileged to have a special tour of the hydro-electric power station at Lake Gordon. The power station itself is 185 metres below ground level in a massive excavation. Hydro-electric power can be switched on and off rapidly and is excellent for handling peak loads and filling in for wind power when the wind isn't blowing. There is room for 5 turbine generators but only 3 have been installed. The newest one can operate as a generator or as a motor. At the time of our visit, which was after the morning demand peak, it was operating as a motor to stabilise the state's power supply voltage and frequency. Then we had a little, unscheduled excitement as the tour group the author was part of was trapped in the lift for about half an hour. After a short delay we were driven out via the

access shaft which was an eye opener in itself. The dam, the power station and the transmission line were quite a feat of engineering.

Happy (at first) to be back with our cars we were soon greeted by rain and some light hail. It was a rather slow, cold and wet drive for much of the way back to Rosetta (on the outskirts of Hobart) for the rally dinner. Low gear was most definitely the order of the day for the steep descents as wet veteran brakes are not particularly effective. Steve Fleming's Studebaker decided that the weather was so bad that it would develop a knock so it could go on to a trailer. It was great to reach Maydena safe and sound where a warm lasagne and salad warmed our insides although it would have been nice if they had lit the fire to warm our outsides as well. There was a platypus cavorting in a pond behind the restaurant. Additionally fortified with chocolate covered ice cream we continued to Rosetta with the weather gradually improving. Almost there the author had to stop at the roadside to attend to the vacuum tank (again!). This actually turned out rather well as the author's navigator managed to get a lovely picture of the car with a full rainbow in the sky above it.

That evening at the official dinner there were prizes for all the rally participants, lots of thank yous, farewells to some of our number who were heading off home the next morning, funny prizes courtesy of John Handley and the author's wife and even the odd limerick or two. For those who lived in the north of the state, those doing the State Rally and those heading back to the boat there were still two more days of rally to go.

Thursday our slightly depleted band headed to Richmond where pictures were taken of cars on Tasmania's oldest bridge, the antique shops were scoured for items we didn't need but had to have and the bakery visited for morning vittals. Then it was on to Oatlands for lunch at the pub. It's a fascinating hotel to say the least, with car parts and other items from yesteryear in both the male and female toilets (The author is not prepared to divulge how he knows). There was also heaps of Marilyn Monroe and Errol Flynn memorabilia on display. Then it was on to Ross with its own historic bridge. Many of us were staying in lovely historic cottages whilst the rest were accommodated in the pub where we all congregated for dinner along with members of the sheep breeders' association. Gavin discovered that the pub locks its doors late at night and despite throwing objects at Loretta's window had to bed down with the Poms.

Friday was sadly the last day of this marvellous adventure. We headed to the Longford Bakery via Cressy for our final lunch together before heading to Turners Beach for pizzas. We farewelled those who were booked on the boat that night as we were staying on for the Tasmanian State Rally which started the very next day.

It must have been nerve racking for them given the recent fire activity in Tasmania, some of it in areas we were to visit. A special thank you to Ashley, Terry and Pat our tail end charlies, Tony and Judy for morning teas, Judy and Stu for baggage support and Alan and Christine for photography. The author is hoping that the team will in time forget just how much effort goes in to running an event such as this and organise another such run, perhaps down the east coast? Wherever and whenever that may be you may take this as the author's expression of interest.

THURSDAY

Thursday kicked off promptly at 2:15pm with a shakedown run billed as 'Wander Through Wandiligong' – a 19km meandering drive through Morses Creek Valley to the Wandiligong heritage listed village with its old buildings colourful gardens and scenic photo opportunities. Many stopped at the 1864 vintage 'Wandy Pub' – which is voted the best rural pub in Victoria, and then on to the Nightingale Bros. Alpine Produce Store and fruit packing facility. Another popular stop was the Wandy Maze for afternoon tea with their famous passionfruit sponge – mmm delicious!

The evening welcoming function was held at Pioneer Park sports ground facility – a modern function centre

catering for not only the local football teams, but also netball. Refreshments were available from Bright Brewery and Ringer Reef Vineyard, and then at 6:15pm John officially welcomed all and introduced the local indigenous people of the Dhu Dhu Roa tribe. For many, what was about to unfold was the highlight of the rally. Local leader Jida explained that he would be performing the Aboriginal welcoming Smoking Ceremony – an ancient custom among some Aboriginal Australians that involves smouldering various native plants that produce smoke which they believe has cleansing properties and the ability to ward off bad spirits. Jida gave a colourful history overview of his own family's journey - his grandmother evidently assisted Ned Kelly's mother Ellen Kelly with various nefarious activities including horse stealing - and we were all both amused and enthralled with Jida's warm personality and engaging stories as he 'cleansed' the rally. With Jida were a group of Aboriginal younger folk from the Northern Territory who were spending a year in Bright learning catering and engaging with the community.

Many of our entrants took the opportunity to be 'cleansed', and UK visitor Andrew Howe-Davies needed an extra long dose of the cleansing smoke (no doubt mindful of Britain's colonial past), while David Provan watched by Robert Tenney took an ample anointing of smoke to the amusement of many.

With the scented smoke wafting over all it was time to move inside for the welcome smorgasbord dinner, prepared by the local indigenous restaurant – and what a spread we had! Here's just a sample: Indigenous spread BBQ Emu, Lemon Myrtle roast chicken, macadamia crushed Barramundi, sunset lentil salad, Warrigal greens with spinach salad, salt bush baby potato. It was a feast! John took the opportunity to thank the team from the Bright Vehicle Preservation Society and their President David Hogg and their large team who did so much to make us welcome and undertook many support duties over the course of the rally.

FRIDAY

Friday was designated the 'Long Run' 125km of the rally, and with an 8:15am briefing and four segments each of about 30km the rolling start saw all off by 8:30am. First stop via Porepunkah was the Myrtleford Golf Club, where a spread of tea, coffee and scones was devoured in the club house. There was time for golf enthusiasts and beginners to show their golfing prowess. The 'closest to the pin' comp saw a field of entries trying their luck. Typical was Peter Hammet whose choice of club for the 130 yards was the 'reason' for his wayward ball off the green. It seemed that young Marcus Edwards was in the hunt for the win only to be upstaged by David Nicholls at the close of the comp. Both were awarded prizes at the Gala Dinner.

The second leg of 33km took us on a back road to Whorouly, and on to the Gibb Family Steam collection, where Robyn and Andrew Gibb have more than 50 steam engines dating from as far back as 1906. A highlight for many was a ride in a 1922 coal fired steam bus. After a box lunch, the third leg took us back along the Snow Road to Myrtleford, with a visit to the unusual Red Ramia store. The final leg of 31km back to Bright saw many stop off at the Pumpkin Seed factory, sampling chocolate coated pumpkin seeds.

SATURDAY

The town of Bright was buzzing on Saturday morning with a farmer's market drawing a crowd, and the veterans were on display for two hours adjacent the Bright Brewery. There were hundreds of locals and tourists, and RACV Director Alex Downie was on hand to enjoy the display and at 10:00am flag us off: Tania Smallman and her husband Martin had their 1911 Stanley Steamer on display, and commented 'It's really good to see people enjoying the cars' – and there was an almost carnival atmosphere amongst the crowd. Engaging with the community is part of our charter with the RACV, and drivers were on hand answering questions – this was veteran motoring on a community level for all to see.

Alex Downie flagged us off for the 19km run down to the Buckland Bridge where a lavish morning tea 'country style' with all the goodies was enjoyed. John introduced local identity Ray Kompe, a chap who 'knows how to live', said John. Ray lives in a secluded bush hut, and his sole income is from gold panning - his record being 43 ounces of gold in 20 minutes! Ray gave us a detailed demonstration of panning beginning with 'play mud pies' and then pan the 'pea soup', and stopping to add water every twenty times, eventually the gold will find its way to the bottom of the pan. Ray says he's had 'more gold pans than breakfasts', and his father was a gold miner, who when Ray was a youngster said, 'Son, I'll teach you the facts of life - gold panning'. He did, and today Ray lives happily as a recluse bachelor in the bush.

John briefed drivers before the 26km run down to the Red Stag deer and emu park and restaurant which had as its approach a road that to veterans was a 'hill climb' – most made it up and a hearty lunch was enjoyed with convivial beverages.

As with any rally there were breakdowns, an on the Saturday John had a full-time job responding to over eight breakdowns – some cars had multiple flat tyres, and the Stanley Steamer also was a victim of 'two flats'! John kept his cool under enormous pressure!

John made special reference to the work done by Michael and Claudia Holding in assisting him with many of the 'back-ofhouse' tasks including clerical and budgeting.

The Ron Hobbs Perpetual Trophy presentation saw Paul Daley acknowledge three previous winners who were present; Colin Daniels (2007), Brian Scudds (2013) and Kevin Quigley (2015). The trophy is awarded by the Rally director of the day who takes into account authenticity, major breakdowns, repairs, and overcoming personal hardship to participate in the Rally. John then announced his winning entry: Martin & Tina Smallman, 1911 Stanley Steamer. There was laughter when John suggested that his choice was biased – of course, a Stanley!





PRE 1905 PIONEER RUN



On April 30th 1900, Messrs H. Thomson and E.L. Holmes left Bathurst to travel to Melbourne. A distance of 493 and a quarter miles, covered in ten days, at an average of 8.72 miles per hour. They encountered

dreadful weather, biting cold, torrential rain, washed out bridges, clay bogs and tracks that were barely tracks. They slept under drover's carts, survived on two day old sandwiches, had only mile posts for direction and blacksmith repairs en route kept the vehicle running. They also experienced amazing hospitality, fantastic interest in the vehicle and their journey and the 'tremendous excitement and pleasure' of 'travelling at fully 40 miles per hour'... 'with the car seemingly alive under us'. They arrived in Melbourne on May 9th 1900.

Successfully proving the practicality of the motor vehicle for Australian conditions. Mr H. Thomson wrote "The introduction of the Motor Car must surely go a long way towards giving the colonies better roads, and it is not a rash statement to make that before long we will have the "coming vehicle" speeding merrily through our country roads, excelling our old friend the horse, and equalling the utility of the railroad."

In 2019, over the weekend of May 18th and 19th, the second run for Pre '05 pioneer vehicles – motor cars, motorcycles, tricycles and quadricycles will happen in Ballarat. Until like Messrs Thomson and Holmes, there will be soft and warm beds, comfortable accommodation and food and drink to satisfy the needs of all. Two days of gentle ambling on the roads that Mr Thomson foresaw with guaranteed 'merrily', and without the need to 'speed'. A glorious weekend of wonderful motoring, joyous company and an opportunity to demonstrate to this part of the world the ingenuity and foresight of motoring's earliest creators and the practicality of their designs.
